Big Canoe/North Georgia Friendship Force to host Azerbaijan delegation

Travel is fatal to prejudice, bigotry, and narrow-mindedness, and many of our people need it sorely on these accounts.

he Congressional Office for International Leadership will send a delegation of five young pro-fessionals plus a facilitator from Azerbaijan to North Georgia. Home-hosted by members of the Friendship Force, these delegates will study how theater and the arts can promote social change

After a short orientation in Washington, D.C., where they hope to meet with congressional staffers, these delegates will arrive in Atlanta on Friday, April 7. The delegates are actors, actresses, singers,

their chosen profession-who have been carefully selected by the U.S. Embassy.

They are coming to the U.S. (many for the first time) to study and contrast how theater (especially musical theater) and education in the cultural and per-forming arts are used in North Georgia vs. their country. By studying and learning all aspects of the cultural arts at all levels, they hope to implement some of these ideas in

An ambitious itinerary developed by bers of the Friendship Force will in clude exposure to the performing arts at all levels from young children (Off Broadway Children's Theatre) to high school (North Forsyth High School) and college productions (Kennesaw State University) to community theatre (Tater Patch) profesEnsemble Theatre). The delegation will also view three plays during their stay including: "Steel Magnolias" at the Tater Patch Theater, "Bright Star"at the Georgia Ensemble Theatre and "Rent" at KSU Planned activities include viewing rehearsals and meeting and asking questions of the directors and the performers backstage. They will also attend drama classes at KSU and contrast curriculums with those in their country. In addition, they will visit the FoCAL Center in Cumming and get exposure to the "Penguin Project, which explores the creative and artistic talents of children with disabilities.

Their stay in Big Canoe will include a pontoon boat ride on Easter Sunday and a lunch-and-learn session with several members of the newly formed Wolfscratch Performing Arts group. Also on the docket is a visit to the National Center for Human and Civil Rights and a meeting with a Georgia senator or staffer. The members of our Friendship Force Club hope to expand our horizons through active dialogue with the delegates-and make new friends for

The objective of Friendship Force is to build goodwill through personal friendship. The committee chair for this visit is Sherry Wileman; Barry Kadechuk of Big Canoe is the current president.
